Criteria for balanced skills/experience on the Board

a)	<i>Knowledge and experience of the communities most affected by HIV and AIDS in New Zealand</i>	Following <i>Art in the Age of AIDS</i> (National Gallery of Australia), in the mid 1990's a number of museums and galleries internationally utilised public institutions to promote positive messages about HIV/AIDS. My personal association with the work of the New Zealand AIDS Foundation began in the late 1990's when Southland Museum & Art Gallery hosted the New Zealand site of <i>Day without Art</i> , which was the first in a succession of annual exhibitions highlighting the impact of HIV on the local and national community. Partnerships were established between the local Invercargill branch of NZAF and also the Dunedin Prostitutes Collective. The exhibitions were supported by leaders such as Michael Parmenter; and also The Angel Eve Trust, and Visual AIDS (NY). In 1996 part of the funding I received through a Winston Churchill Fellowship was applied to studying the impact of HIV/AIDS on contemporary art practices internationally, and I spent time in the UK and US professionally meeting a number of groups working within education relating to HIV/AIDS (Visual AIDS; Keith Haring Foundation, etc).
b)	<i>Skills in and experience of governance processes</i>	I have previously served on a number of not-for-profit Boards, which included the Southland Art Foundation; Museums Aotearoa; Katherine Mansfield Birthplace Society; Youthline Southland. I am currently a Senior Member of the New Zealand Trustees Association. In addition I have held a number of ex-officio roles ranging from Nelson Branch of NZHPT, Tasman District Council Heritage Committee, and Invercargill

		Performing Arts Centre Steering Committee. These ranged from single entities, to local authority committees, to national committees.
c)	<i>Knowledge and skill in Tikanga Māori</i>	Working within the cultural heritage sector, I have been privileged to have been allowed the time and opportunity to work with a number of kuia and kaumatua, who were prepared to offer a guiding hand. Supporting groups such as Kaitiaki Maori, and also supporting staff to participate in these groups has provided me with the opportunity to work closely with iwi on a number of different issues.
d)	<i>Understanding of the application of the principles and articles of the Treaty of Waitangi</i>	Taking a personal example throughout the late 1990's and into the early part of this century, a number of museums found themselves at a crossroads supporting iwi as they worked their way through the Treaty claims process. The partnerships established between institution, iwi and individuals allowed the transfer of knowledge and information which supported a holistic vision. Applying many of those experiences to NZAF, we have the opportunity to strengthen our working relationship with tangata whenua, and also at the same time educate a wider community on a virus which knows no boundary.
e)	<i>Skills in, and experience of, government processes</i>	Working in and around local and central government I am aware of the processes of Government, and also of the requirements of external organisations that are required to lobby central government for support, funding, or to demonstrate outcomes.
f)	<i>Accounting skills and experience</i>	My financial experience ranges from running my own business in the 1990's to overseeing the finances of organisations that I have worked in. These roles ranged from CEO, Tasman Bays Heritage Trust; GM, Museums Aotearoa; Head of Operations, Museum of Islamic Art, Doha; and most currently as Manager, Arts and Culture, Whakatane District Council. I have also been involved in a number of successful fundraising campaigns for both operational and capital expenditure for a number of organisations; as well as the establishment of endowment funds.
